New Prison Ministry Program

The Camden Diocese already has an established Prison Ministry of several volunteers who go inside the jails and prisons, so why start a new Prison Ministry for those who are newly released?

On Nov. 8, 2019, Pope Francis addressed the participants who were attending a two-day conference on Catholic Prison Ministry at the Vatican. He said, "Catholics have an obligation to recognize the humanity of those who have left the prison system, and to help them get back on their feet."

In 2020 the American Criminal Justice System had 2.3 million people incarcerated in the jails and prisons throughout the country. What were the situations that led people into crime that warranted incarceration? It's complex, but mainly they were: Poverty, Family Conditions, Alcohol and drug abuse, Parental neglect, Low self- esteem, Peer Pressure, and Unemployment. For persons ages 18-26, it could have been an under matured brain. Neuroscience and technology have discovered that the brain does not finish developing and maturing until the mid to late 20s. The risks and mistakes made by 18-to-26-year old's may be outside of their control as they come from impulsive actions, poorly measured decisions, and peer pressure.

Each day in our country thousands of the incarcerated have done their time and are released. For the fortunate ones with family, friends and a support group, they are off to a new life. However, those who have no support group, friends or family, they are off to a different form of incarceration – social punishment. They are treated like they are in a tomb – forgotten, rejected, shunned, feared. What did Jesus do when his friend Lazarus was in a tomb? He gathered the community and enlisted them in helping him to bring new life to Lazarus. First, he asked the people to roll away the stone. Then he called to Lazarus to come out, which he did. However, he couldn't do much due to the burial cloths which impeded him. So, Jesus asked the community to take them off. It took Jesus, Lazarus and the community to bring this miracle of new life to fruition.

You have heard the expression, "It takes a village to raise a child." With our new Prison Ministry Program, we could say, "It takes a parish to help a newly released person get back on his/her feet."



IN MEMORIAM Rev. William J. Bleiler, Priest of Mercy

Father Bill, as we called him, was an exemplary and most faithful priest who had an outgoing missionary spirit and a burning zeal to serve. His life experiences ran the gamut from being a plumber, (he once told us that "bleiler" means plumber in German), serving in the military, studying in Rome and being ordained by Pope Paul VI, serving as a missionary in Brazil, and ministering to migrants and veterans in New Jersey. Father Bill was a highly educated man and was well-versed in several languages. He certainly accomplished a great deal in his life-time. We can say that he was a **big** man in every way, with an even bigger heart for God and others.



After a very brief illness of just a few days, the Lord called Father Bill to his Heavenly Home on June 17. Possessing a joyful heart and a generous spirit, Father Bleiler had a vibrant and caring presence that touched the hearts of all who knew him. He truly valued and revered his priesthood. Father Bleiler was spiritually bonded to our Religious Community as our own Priest of Mercy. He knew well the life of St. Mary Joseph Rossello and made it his mission to spread devotion to her. His love for the Daughters of Mercy was genuine, and the proof was in his constant kindness to us, and his efforts to attend every community event.

In 1987, Father Bleiler traveled to our Generalate in Italy on the occasion of the 150th Anniversary of the Founding of our Institute. While there, he made a big impact on all the Sisters and members of our Rossellian Family. After that, he was more connected than ever to our religious congregation.

Now, from his place in heaven, he continues to look after us as he takes on his intercessory role on our behalf. Rest in peace, Father Bill, faithful servant of the Lord and model Priest of Mercy!

A VIEW FROM MY WINDOW

Quite a few years ago, there was a popular song for children composed by Carey Landry

"Like a Sunflower" This melodious tune began with these words:

"Like a sunflower that follows every movement of the sun,
So, I turn toward you, to follow you, my God."

Now I will tell you why I am recalling this sweet little song to mind.

Some of you reading this might be artistic and creative, others, like me, may not have that gift to any great degree. Well, through the generosity of one of our RFO members, several years ago, Sister Claudia and I were invited to a "Paint N' Enjoy" Night at St. Joseph Parish here in York. Even though happy to accept the invitation, I was a bit reluctant at the thought of being "challenged" to be creative with a blank canvas before me, some water paints and brushes of various sizes and textures, all items of which I only once or twice briefly touched as a child in school. Notwithstanding all this, of course I wanted to participate anyway. Before continuing, I just want to let you know, that, in the end, the event turned out to be a night of great fun and enjoyment.

The subject of "Paint N' Enjoy" was to paint just a portion of an already traced sunflower on our blank canvas. The talented teacher who conducted this art experience led us every step of the way, while encouraging us to add our own creative touches as we painted away. Now, mind you, my painting didn't turn out to be anywhere near "a work of art" – not even close to any stretch of the imagination, but it is at least recognizable as a sunflower. And where is it now? Well, I found an empty space on the wall in the basement which just happened to have a nail in it... and there my sunflower found its home! It's nothing to brag about but it does add some color to the dull basement wall! It remains on that wall to this day and will probably be there until some future brave soul removes it!

And that leads me to share my reflection on the "sunflower." First of all, I was fascinated when I first learned the Italian name for sunflower – "girasole" – which literally means "turn to the sun," (in Spanish the word is "girasol").

In looking at a sunflower I am reminded of the sun with its extending rays reaching out and embracing the horizon at all points. As the sunflower turns its face towards the sun, so do we turn our faces to God and allow him to shine His merciful face upon us. Yes, we let the **Son** shine on us through the sun! Our lives are like the soft yellow petals of a sunflower with every layer signifying a different phase of life – a new step in life's evolving daily journey. The petals are not purely golden but rather streaked with shades and hues of black and brown. For me this signifies that the daily journey we are all traversing is not always neat and smooth. Rather there are ups and downs, joys and sorrows, not so good times and good times, However, the journey, with its various shades of hues and colors, twists and turns, starts at the center and directs us outward and upward as do the petals of each sunflower. Clearly, we are not put here on this earth to be creatures in isolation, but rather to be constantly involved in the lives of others drawing inspiration from Christ as our Center.

The sunflower has a distinct and prominent center that can be likened to our relationship with God – our central focus. I once read that sunflowers are popular with butterflies because the wide center makes a good and solid "landing platform." Like a reliable anchor, the firm center of the flower holds the petals of our lives together and transforms them into a brilliant reflection of the One who loves and sustains us along life's daily journey. Like the sunflower, let us bask in the Lord's love, hold on firmly to the "landing platform," our safe and certain harbor, and allow God's love to surround us, and shine through us to reach the hearts of others!
