

The Centennial Celebration at Villa Rossello on Saturday was the grandest of all occasions! The Mass celebrated in the chapel was described by one person as "a taste of heaven." The planning and preparation invested by all resulted in an overwhelming feast for the soul! The receiving of Jesus the Bread of Life is the singular and ultimate highlight of this and every Mass. The flowers, the music, the rich presence of clergy, the bursting-at-the-seams congregation all contributed to the sensory brilliance of the Liturgy. The homily presented by Bishop Gainer of the Harrisburg Diocese was nothing short of extraordinary. Bishop, at first, presented a mini history of the contributions of Religious Sisters to the Church in the

United States. He described these contributions as "irreplaceable"; he described the Sisters as "valiant, heroic, and self-sacrificing." Then he placed the arrival of the Daughters of Our Lady of Mercy in 1919 into the grand history of women religious in the USA. Bishop described the original Sisters as "daring" and "selfless" as they came to a new land from Italy and Argentina. Further, he said how the Daughters of Mercy show what it's like to "live under God's reign, to do the serious work of the kingdom, and to be instruments of God's mercy in confident trust."

The delicious meal that followed, along with lively conversations and presentations of anniversary congratulations, continued the celebration. A most beautiful slide show of archive photos continuously played on the big screen in Carew Hall. Most special (to this one observer) was the individual photo/memorial card of the deceased members of the Daughters of Mercy shown one by one on the screen with a blue sky/white cloud "heavenly" background - while the background music played Steve Green's "Find Us Faithful." 
CONGRATULATIONS, NOVICE JOANA!

RFO NEWS AND VIEWS

Visiting the Stranger at the York County Prison by Phil Shar

"...I was in prison and you visited me." Matthew 25:35-36

Let me take a few minutes to tell you about how 2 RFO members from York became involved in visiting detained immigrants. Well, it all started with Adele Naglieri and I attending a Christmas Concert held at the Eastminster Presbyterian Church in East York during the Fall of 2018. The concert featured the York County Honors Choir performing both sacred hymns and popular songs. At the end of the concert, on the way out of the Church, Adele and I noticed a poster on the wall advertising the "Walking Together" Program. Dates and times for an informational meeting were indicated for those interested in learning more about the program. After reading the poster, we both decided to learn more about it. The information session was held at the 1st Presbyterian Church in downtown York on a weekday evening. Approximately 50 people attended the meeting. Representatives from the Pennsylvania Immigration Resource Center - PIRC, the Landisville Mennonite Church, and the York YMCA were there to provide an explanation of the program, and answer questions. After their presentation, Adele and I decided to participate, and we submitted our names for clearance and background checks to the local prison officials.

The purpose of the Walking Together Visitation Program is to visit the 700+/- undocumented asylum-seeking detainees housed at the York County Prison. This prison is the largest facility on the East Coast housing immigrants detained by ICE. We meet with our designated detainee on Tuesday afternoons for 30 minutes of light conversation sharing stories about our background, activities, and interests. We are **Not** advocates for their release; but rather just another human being reaching out to offer them a smile and good cheer until their cases can be resolved in immigration court.

I have been meeting with Timur, a young man of 36 from Kazakhstan, who overstayed his Visa. Timur is fluent in Kazahk, Russian, Spanish, and is now learning Chinese. (Timur and I speak English at our meetings). Timur has told me about his brother, parents, his work in NYC, and his plans to start a

business after his release. I have shared my background, cycling, travel, and learning activities with

Timur. His hearing to decide his



fate, is scheduled for some date in November. He hopes to be represented by an attorney from PIRC. Timur hopes to re-unite with his brother in NYC. His brother has already obtained his Permanent Resident Status.

The experience of meeting and speaking with Timur has been very gratifying to me. Sharing time together with the members of the Landisville Mennonite Church has also been very special and rewarding. The overall experience has certainly re-enforced and solidified the Gospel message of Matthew 25:35-36; and the admonitions of St. Mary Joseph Rossello.

So, think about that Christmas Concert back in the Fall of 2018. How do you/we explain the chance reading of the information

poster at the exit of the Church? And our decision to

participate in the Visitation program with No special language skills. Was it Serendipity? Or, was it the action of the Holy Spirit guiding us???

Adele adds:

As a continuation of what Phil Shar reported on our visits to the detainees at York County Prison, the following has been my experiences.

I have had approximately 5 visits to the prison. I have visited three different females. All of which have been so happy with the comfort and support we are giving to these immigrant inmates. Their homelands are Serbia, Argentina and Mexico. The young lady from Mexico has actually been in the US 23 years. The cost to become a citizen is prohibitive. The visits are 30 minutes each time and during this time we have relaxed conversations about our lives and there is always time for prayer. Personally, I feel I am following Jesus and doing his will. Sr. Amelia has also accompanied me on several of the visits and the staff, the Walking Together group and the inmates are so happy with her presence. She is especially helpful because of her ability to speak Spanish.

On Friday, 8/30/19, Phil and I really experienced the feeling of helping to do God's will when, the evening before, an email came out to the Walking Together group notifying us that a male detainee was being released on Friday. We were being asked if someone would be available to bring him \$20-30 for his trip by bus from Harrisburg to Texas. Since most of the members of our group are from Lancaster, I immediately said I would be there since I am only a mile away. Phil came along, first gathering together some clothing, toiletries, snacks, a rosary and a copy of "Rediscovering Jesus." We were not

able to meet Moises because he was picked up inside the gate but the van driver was eager to help us and happy to see that Moises received his departure kit.

We hope St. Mary Joseph Rossello is watching down on all of us as we are trying to continue her vision of mercy for humanity.

ONCE UPON A TIME...

Do you believe in fairy tales? Well I want to talk about three fairy tales and share something with you about them. Now why am I speaking about fairy tales? Because this past summer – from August 12 to 18th, seven Daughters of Mercy (not the seven dwarfs)



had the privilege of attending a different kind of retreat given by Sister Clare D'Auria, OSF at the Franciscan Spiritual Center in Aston, PA. The title of the retreat was: "Once Upon a Time": "The Parables of the Magic Kingdom." Having had Sister Clare for two other retreats, I knew we couldn't go wrong in choosing this retreat with its enticing title and the promise of happy endings!

In the brochure advertising this retreat we read "Listening again to these stories with a Gospel ear to the call of conversion proclaimed by Jesus, we will discover the truly happy endings that can come to women like ourselves who wear glass slippers, look into mirrors, and ply spindles for the sake of the kingdom of God."

The first fairy tale film we watched and then reflected on was "Sleeping Beauty" with the theme "Stay



Awake." The gospel passage linked with it was Romans 13:11 - You know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith.

In developing this theme "Stay Awake," Sister Clare had us reflect on the parable of the 10 virgins from Mt 25:1-13. Questions were posed such as How do you "stay awake to the presence of God in your daily life? Are there questions or concerns that "keep you awake" at night. What grace do you need to ask for to "stay awake" rather than "keep awake?"

Sleeping Beauty's name was "Aurora" which, as we know means *the dawn*. How may God be inviting us to wake up (to the dawn) and accept what is true so that we may be

ready for "the hour"?

Stay awake, wait for the Prince, persevere in prayer, pray always!

The second fairy tale we were ushered into was "Snow White" – Even though this film dates back to 1937, the animation was well done! Leave it to Disney!

In reflecting on this theme, 1 Cor:11-13 was used as our call to prayer:

When I was a child, I used to talk like a child, think like a child, reason like a child. When I became an adult, I put childish ways aside. Now we see indistinctly, as in a mirror: then we shall see face to face.

And this led to a reflection on the parables of the Treasure and the Pearl – Mt 13:44-46.

A question posed was: When you look in the mirror, what do you see? Most importantly, who do you see? How much do you focus on the image you project, that is, how you appear to others? What roles have you assumed that have masked your true self from being seen by others?

The challenge is to make the journey down the well of the spiritual journey and get to know our true selves.

How nice to sit back and once again watch that wonderful tale of "Cinderella." The Call to Prayer was Romans 12:2:



Do not conform yourselves to this age, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind and heart, so that you may judge what is God's will, what is good, pleasing and perfect.

Then we reflected on the parables of the Mustard Seed and the Yeast – Mt. 13:31-33 indicating that the Kingdom of God is everywhere and is for everyone.

A question posed was What is the unchangeable, imperishable core of who you are to which everything else must be "fitted" and conformed? As you move through the transformation that is the journey of your life now, who do you want to be? Whose do you want to be? What grace do you need to ask for from God to support you in your desire?

"Be transformed, wear the shoe that fits. Be the image of the Incarnation."

There was much more but I have just given you a glimpse of this wonderful retreat experience. From the above, we can conclude that there is much symbolism in fairy tales that we can apply to our spiritual journey. Fairy tales explain truth and, parables, of course, lead us to the Prince of the Gospels and the Kingdom within. As for our relationship with the Prince of the Gospels, let us reflect on the inspired wisdom of St. Clare of Assisi:

Gaze, consider, contemplate so that we may imitate:

Gaze - Stay Awake

Consider – Know Yourself

Contemplate - Pray always

Imitate – Be transformed.

Do you believe in "fairy" tales? I do, especially if they are the parables of the Prince!

...At that time Jesus said in reply, "I give praise to you Father, Lord of heaven and earth, for although you have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you have revealed them to the childlike." Mt 11:25-27
